Duke of Edinburgh and Batik painting made for varied extra-curricular activities.

























































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The standard of music at Read never fails to astonish. New parents always gasp at our soloists and groups whether they are singing, playing instruments, composing their own music, or all of the above.


No wonder students were literally jumping for joy in photographs in the local press with GCSE and A Level results that would make anyone leap and whoop.

Congratulations to those students who didn't let a little thing like a world virus get in the way of their bright futures. Teaching staff were cock-a-hoop with 100% pass rate for all A-levels: 65% at A* - B. All pupils achieving first-choice university destinations, including many Russell Group.

In addition, 99% GCSE passes were at grade 4+, with 34% of grades 7-9 (A/A*/+) & 66% of grades 6-9 (A*-B). Standout individual results across Sciences, Maths, Languages, Music & PE, with five grade 9s awarded – higher than old A*. Not too shabby.




