Welcome to the 2021-2022 edition of the Draxonian magazine.

We reflect back on the progress and achievements of the past year with great pride. This was the year when Read School, like all other schools across the country, recovered from the trauma of Covid and rejoiced in the return to normality and things that had previously been taken for granted such as inter-school sports, elimination of pupil 'bubbles' and a gradual resumption of all the normal Read School activities, not least being able to welcome parents back on site for concerts and other events in school.

Despite the continuing challenges imposed by the pandemic, Read School had a very successful year, reflected in the quality of provision inside and outside the classroom for pupils of all ages, with practical lessons in Science, Creative Arts and Food resuming along with educational trips and visits. The richness of our curriculum for pupils from Reception to Sixth Form is certainly illustrated in the enclosed photos and articles and indeed so kaleidoscopic is the activity reflected that it fills some 188 pages!

The pupil roll grew from 224 in September 2021 to 250 pupils by the end of the academic year and we were again profoundly grateful for the many parent referrals which continue to fuel enquiries. My grateful thanks to the dedicated and talented teaching and support team that made all of this possible and to parents, governors and Draxonian alumni for your ongoing support. Finally, well done to our talented and hardworking pupils who never fail to surprise and inspire us.

We hope that you enjoy this bumper edition of the 2021-2022 Draxonian and that it provides a memorable keepsake for many years to come.



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




















Cannon Hal Farm
















Mother's Day Afternoon Tea




















Lower Junior School Wellness week

Says goodbye

At the end of the year, we sadly said goodbye to Mrs Wynne who retired after nearly 20 years at Read School. Her inspirational farewell speech is reprinted here in full...

For those of you who don't know who I am my name is Caroline Wynne and today I am hoping to become a recovering workaholic and a successful retired teacher. When I was 5 years old I came home from Sunday school and disappeared into my bedroom. About half an hour later the roast beef and Yorkshire puddings were on the table and my mum was shouting me to come down for lunch. I ignored her and eventually she found me engrossed in teaching all of my dolls and teddies the story of Noah's Ark. The writing was on the wall! I never actually remember wanting to do anything else other than teach so in 1983 l embarked on a 4 year Batchelor of education degree at the university of York St John and the rest as they say is history! Apart from the occasional wet Monday morning driving to school or facing an Ofsted inspection or indeed every year at

report writing time it is a decision I have never regretted. Why teach? You may ask. It's certainly not for financial gain. It's certainly not for an easy life, although the summer holiday is definitely a perk! For me it's simple. I love the company of young children. I much, in all honesty prefer children and dogs to many of the adults I know! Their innocence and enquiring minds, the way they see the world is a constant joy. Someone once said that teaching is less about stuffing the cooking pot full and more about lighting the fire. To ignite that flame and to care for and nurture young children is both a responsibility and a privilege. I think back to a day, many years ago when I was teaching at a school in a very deprived area when a little girl who was living with just her father who was himself having a very difficult time came into school and about half way through the morning said to me "Mrs Wynne. I think it is my birthday today but nobody at home has mentioned it. How terribly sad. A stark contrast to my children now who have the most wonderful

parties weeks in the planning. Myself and my teaching assistant hot footed it into town at lunchtime for party food and presents and lessons that afternoon were cancelled. What a difference we made to that little girl's life that day! There can be few jobs with that kind of reward!

In 1989 my husband and I decided to sell up and travel the world. For a while we lived and worked in Sydney, Australia and I worked for an office supply company. The joy of paper clips and office politics were not very enticing and I knew on returning to the UK I would definitely be going back into teaching.

I have taught in Manchester, Leeds, Selby and the surrounding area and in 2004 a chance and I can wholeheartedly say very lucky encounter led me to my job here at Read. I always had a golden rule. When you, on a regular basis are not enthusiastic about going to work it is time to leave. In 18 years here I simply never had that feeling. Read school is such a special place. We often talk about the Read school family but it is so true. On open mornings Mrs Fairhurst and I always tell prospective parents it's a great place to learn but it's also a great place to teach. Put simply, everyone looks after each other, everyone is valued, everyone feels safe and respected and there can be no better conditions for learning and thriving. I have never worked in a school where the parents are so friendly and supportive. In my experience lovely parents do indeed make lovely children. This year as some of you know I had the awful experience of having to have my beloved dog put to sleep. The lovely homemade cards, the daisies picked in the playground and all the hugs reminded me why have loved my job so much.

I would like to thank Mrs Ainley for her dedication, inspirational leadership and vision for the school. We have a school that is thriving and gaining a reputation for excellence in the local area. Thank you also to the governors who work tirelessly for the good of the school. Thank you to my colleagues who are the most talented and hard working people I have had the privilege to work with. To Mr Hill, Mrs Wake and Mrs Campbell in Upper Juniors whose dedication to their job knows no bounds. In particular today my biggest thanks goes to my partner in crime, Mrs Fairhurst. She is not only a very talented and creative teacher but also a wonderful friend. Lisa, your generosity and kindness and your wicked sense of humour have made coming to work a pleasure. I know that with you and Miss Butterill the Lower Juniors are in very safe hands!

After a long career you learn many things and on approaching retirement I would like to leave you with some advice. Children – make the most of every opportunity that comes your way. Laugh a lot and take joy in the small things in life. In this age of social media try to find your own values and beliefs and always strive to be

authentic to yourself. Adults - enjoy more and worry less! When you are 20 you worry what people think about you. When you are 40 you don't care what people think about you. And when you are almost 60 you realise that no one was actually ever thinking about you in the first place!! Always try to be the bigger and better person. Sometimes people can be disappointing but they have very likely experienced something in their day to make them behave the way they have. As I constantly say to my children "if you can be anything today, be kind!" Make it count. Don't sweat the small stuff. Life goes so very quickly. Believe me. One minute you are reading bible stories to your toys and the next you are delivering your retirement speech!

So I'm off to pastures new. Many adventures in my camper van with my husband. Long term goals; learning Italian and learning to play the cello. Short term goals; afternoon naps, baking, reading and netflix box sets. In short I'm looking forward to having more time to do the things I love! Goodbye tension, hello pension!!

All that remains is for me to thank you again for being the best parents, best colleagues and most wonderful children anyone could have worked with and to wish the Read School family lots of love and continued success for the future. Thank you!!







The Memorial Library was built as a memorial to those boys of the school who were killed in action during the Second World War. Their names are listed on the memorial outside this building.




















Leeds United Cooking Competition in

In March all pupils who were chosen for the final were invited to attend Elland Road. They ate at the ground and took a tour of the hospitality aspect and the grounds.

Level 3 leiths course

This year has seen the introduction of the Leiths Level 3 Certificate in Food and Wine with CTH. (The confederation of Tourism and Hospitality). Leith's is one of the world's most prestigious cookery schools. This course is designed to teach the basic skills necessary to become a confident and efficient cook. Completion of this course will not only gain children a valuable skill for life, but could also open up possible areas of employment. Pupils gain the confidence to cook by making judgments on the







ingredients purchased, the dishes and wines put together for menu choices, and the methods used to cook and serve food to achieve the best results. Pupils design a set menu of dishes each week, going on to create these as part of a three-hour practical assessment. During the course, pupils also study for the Level 2 Food Safety in Catering Award. We have achieved 100% pass rate so far.

They planned and prepared a stir fry and a pasta dish which followed the Eatwell guide.










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




After gaining inspiration from Carlton Towers Cookery School where Year 7 spent the morning learning how to make tortellini with a roasted vegetable pasta sauce, pupils returned to school to plan and prepare their own pasta dishes with great success. They also learnt about B9, B2 Vit D and calcium during the year to build up their knowledge about healthy eating.











Year 8 made lasagne, fish pie and moroccan lamb tagine then planned and prepared a high protein and low saturated fat dish of their own. This links well with learning how to avoid food poisoning when cooking with high risk foods.

They also learnt about bread and pastry making and celebration foods.

During the year they researched vitamins E, K B2 & B3 to add to their nutritional knowledge.

Year 9 Cookery

Year 9 learnt about the nutritional needs of elderly people and planned a dish to meet them. They justified their choices, stating when ingredients had the nutrients vit A to help with eyesight, B vitamins to assist with slowing memory loss, low calories and calcium and vitamin D to help bone stay strong. 






Duke of Edinburgh







The Duke of Edinburgh's Award (commonly abbreviated DofE) is a youth awards programme founded in the United Kingdom in 1956 by Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. 14-24 year-olds can do a DofE programme at one of three progressive levels which, when successfully completed, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award all of which are opportunities at Read School. There are four sections to complete at Bronze and Silver level and five at Gold. They involve helping the community/environment, becoming fitter, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition and, for Gold only, working with a team on a residential activity.

Expedition section

Pupils are invited to take part in training sessions after school each week along with a choice of two 1 day training walks in the York Wolds. 30 bronze DofE participants completed their practice expedition in glorious sunshine. Four groups walked from different starting points in the Bishop Wilton/Millington area and then went on to complete their qualifying expedition in the Nidderdale Valley. For some this was a huge challenge both mentally and physically. They carried all they needed to be self-sufficient for 2 days walking in the beautiful setting of Nidderdale Valley. They worked as teams navigating their way for 6 hours walks each day camping up Middlesmoore with a specular view down the valley. Memories have been made.

Two Silver groups walked for 7 hours each day for 3 days and completed their silver DofE expedition. They were blessed with the weather and enjoyed the beautiful scenery of the North Yorkshire Moors. Finally a group of Gold DofE pupils took on the challenge of walking for 4 days in the North Yorkshire Moors to complete their Gold expedition section. Each level enables children to develop better communication, commitment, leadership and teamwork.

Other sections

The other sections to the award which are of equal importance are helping the community/environment, becoming fitter, developing new skills and, for Gold only, working with a team on a residential activity.

We know from hearing thousands of stories that volunteering has a huge impact on young people. This has included helping elderly neighbours, coaching younger children's sports teams, helping in nursery and junior schools etc. It's such an essential part of a DofE programme. Whether it's by giving back to their community, developing a passion for a particular cause, or learning a new skill through their volunteering activity, the Volunteering section changes lives and has a positive impact on communities. Participants from The Read School dedicated 559 hours to volunteering between April 2021 and March 2022, with a social value of £2582.58. This is an incredible achievement that we are very proud of.

This year's Senior School production, The Wizard of Oz was possibly the most welcomed show we've performed in recent years. After two years of theatre closures and performance restrictions, senior pupils were more than ready to get back on stage and share their talents to an eager audience.

Choosing The Wizard of Oz as this year's show was easy: we had a very eager group of children and just the right combination of talent to make each of the roles work perfectly. It's a show that we had been keen to put on and it's one that is always popular with any age group – we were on to a winner before we began!

Published in 1900 The Wonderful Wizard of Oz was the first in a series of stories by L Frank Baum about the adventures Dorothy, a young girl from Kansas who is swept over the rainbow by a tornado. It might not have become the success it has if the manager of the Chicago Opera house had not committed to creating a musical version in order to promote sales of the book. Baum hadn't expected a great deal of sales, but the second edition sold out by October of that year:

The play was revised to suit adult audiences and in 1938 MGM bought the rights resulting in the making of the iconic 1939 film with Judy Garland. The film was made in glorious technicolour with the exception of the Kansas scenes, which was acknowledged in the Read School production, using dull colours which give way to the vibrant and colourful landscape of Munchkinland and then Oz.

The cast was led by Evelyn Crompton playing Dorothy who started the show with the most famous song of all, 'Over the Rainbow'. Evelyn's vocal, acting and dancing skills were consistently impressive throughout the show and her beautiful voice moved the audience right from the outset. After leaving her Aunt Em, Uncle Henry and Joe, ably played by Verity Haigh, veteran Read performer Jamie Holdich and Hayden Branston-Walls, Dorothy found herself over the rainbow with all manner of strangely-attired Munchkins. On finding she had inadvertently killed a witch, the kind and gentle Sorceress, played beautifully by Lizzy Nield set her on her way home via the Yellow Brick Road. Lizzy also treated the audience to a stunning piece of ballet later in the show, proving what a versatile performer she is.

As Evelyn took us on Dorothy's journey, she was in turn joined by new friends Scarecrow, Tin Man





and Lion. Sophie Sayner's spectacular Scarecrow saw her bending and twisting, tripping and falling, all brilliantly choreographed into the first rendition of 'We're off to see the Wizard'. A further solo dance scene later in the evening showcased Sophie's impressive dancing skills.

Next was Jack Mustill's Tin Man who ably took on the role of the man on a quest for a heart. By the time he'd discovered he had one all the time, he'd taken us through a range of emotions and some superb singing and dancing.

Soon Dorothy met the Lion played by Millie Smith who at times stole the show with her funny but indignant cowardly character. Millie had some superb lines which she delivered with perfect timing much to the amusement of the audience.

Once our heroes arrived in Oz we met a couple of new characters who were not familiar to our audience. The Read version may not have included Dorothy's dog Toto, but we did get to meet Lord Growlie, the affable mayor of Oz played by Miller Robinson and his daughter Gloria played by Tyla Champagnie who led the well-loved "Merry Old Land of Oz' song with strong vocals.

Every good story needs a villain and her accomplices, and we were treated to a fabulous performance by Kate Ives as the Wicked Witch, ably supported by Izzy Addinall, Neve Bentley and Abigail Cheetham.

By the time the fabulous four had defeated the Wicked Witch, it only remained for The Wizard himself, played impressively by Freddie Thomlinson to present our heroes with their awards and send Dorothy back over the rainbow home in his rocket ship.

A very strong chorus supported all the main characters to produce a piece of musical theatre of very high quality. Set, props and the backstage crew were all instrumental in producing a first class show.

The whole company excelled in their performances and the audience was left impressed with the standards our pupils reached. A wonderful evening was enjoyed by everyone.

Lessons for All!

Read Music Department operates a system which allows all pupils in Junior School to have free tasters in violin and wind instruments. Those pupils who learn a woodwind instrument are put in for an Arts Award. This is an initiative the Music Department runs, allowing all pupils in Year 6 the opportunity to learn how to play a woodwind instrument, as well as understand about the types of music played by the instrument. An informal assessment takes place which, if successful, results in an Arts Award. Thank you to Mrs. Farmery (our peripatetic woodwind teacher) for running this course.

Selby Bells

We were extremely pleased to be able to welcome back the Selby Bell ringers after nearly 2 years! They played a series of Christmas Carols to Year 6 and then the pupils all had a go at playing a bell. They realised how difficult it can be to play at a single moment in time! Bell ringing is an excellent skill due to improving timing, and is also open to anyone – even those who cannot read music – as notation is by numbers rather than notes.







Music Society

This is a society that encourages pupils to visit professional musical events – such as musicals, ballets and orchestral concerts. In November we went to see Wizard of Oz at The Joseph Rowntree Theatre in York. It was a really special occasion as our very own Scarlett Waugh (Year 8) played the leading role of Dorothy. We were really impressed with the performance, especially Scarlett, who sang beautifully and acted with a very professional American dialect.



At the beginning of the year, some of our peripatetic team came together to demonstrate an array of musical instruments to LJS, UJS and Year 8.

We discussed the values of learning an instrument – such as improving memory, concentration, coordination, social skills, as well as having fun.

Mrs. Crompton played many different film extracts on the piano, showing how it is possible to play anything with practice, and illustrating how music is found everywhere! Pupils managed to correctly guess: 'Pink Panther', 'Jurassic Park', 'Mission Impossible', 'Titanic', 'Harry Potter', 'Raiders of the Lost Ark'. Mrs. Crompton then showed how it is possible to transfer keyboard skills onto other instruments – such as accordion, where she played 'Pirates of the Caribbean'.

An introduction to brass instruments consisted of Mrs. Crompton playing the 'Wake Up Call' which uses no valves. She demonstrated how you can play a variety of notes using your diaphragm and tightening your lips. She showed pupils the sound of a wah-wah mute, rolling an r down the instrument, and 1/2 valve horse whinnies!

Mr. Cocker wowed the pupils with his guitar playing, and Mr. Moulson played a variety of wind instruments, ranging from recorder, to a metal







clarinet, and saxophone. A favourite was the electric saxophone that played without having to blow down it! Mr. Clark showed us how coordinated you have to be to play the drums, asking us to rub our head, pat our stomach, tap our right foot on the beat, and our left foot twice on the beat!

The team then came together to play an arrangement of 'Bad Habits' – illustrating the social side of music-making.

Peripatetic Team

We are lucky to have such a dedicated set of peripatetic staff who come in to teach over 80 pupils each week individual instrument lessons. Some of these staff also help run extra-curricular clubs before school, at breaktimes, lunchtimes, and afterschool. Samba Group is one of these groups, led by our percussion teacher. Mr. Clark. The pupils learn how to keep different rhythms in time on a variety of percussion instruments.









Christmas Events!

In early December, some of our Senior School musicians entertained members from Dementia UK at Drax Social Club, playing a selection of Christmas songs and carols on a variety of instruments.








Multicultural nsic


